Based on what is known today about COVID-19, most college students are not representative of a high risk population for the virus. Current data suggest that those most at risk are the elderly and those with compromised immune systems or underlying chronic medical illness. The following guidelines apply to all SU students in their clinicals, field placements, and internships:

Education formats such as clinical, small simulation, field placements, internships, and other similar experiences may continue on a case-by-case basis with approval from the Dean.

Attend clinicals, field placements, or internships if they have been asked to self-quarantine by public health authorities or in accordance with USM guidelines

Participate in the care of known or suspected COVID-19 patients

At any site that is treating a patient with COVID-19 where appropriate environmental controls cannot be implemented per CDC quidelines

At any site when crisis standards of care are used to care for COVID-19 patients

At any site unable to provide students with site-specific, appropriate personal protective equipment. Students are encouraged to provide their own face mask/shield. If this is not possible, the University will provide face masks/shields.

1-4 hours credit Supervised experience in art-related work to provide students with an opportunity to use acquired knowledge and skills in a professional way. Prerequisites: Experience intended for juniors and seniors with 32 or more hours in Art, including 8 hours in their Program Track.
For 4 credit hours, a student must be scheduled to work for about 200 hours at a supervised job. 50 hours of on-site work are required for each credit in an internship.

Once approved by a faculty mentor, the community partner and the chair of the department, sign up for SPAN 498 (Internship).

Four credits are usually awarded for one semester s worth of service. The experience/course, if available and approved, may be repeated for a total of eight credits. SPAN 498 counts toward your major or minor.

Perform a minimum of six hours of service per week over a 13-week period with an approved community partner. Additionally, you meet for 50 minutes biweekly in seminar for discussion of assigned readings and reflection.




